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POTTER'S FIELD NOT FOR DELINI , FRIENDS DECIDE

Burial Arranged for Son Of Polish Noble Family.

Stephen Delini, 52, the son of a Polish noble family who died penniless, was saved from a pauper's grave yesterday by friends who took his body from the County Morgue and arranged burial today.

Delini, a master of seven languages, was foun overcome by gas fumes in his dismal, attic room Wednesday, when his landlord went up to deliver a WPA check.

Served in Russian Navy

Though he had served in the Russian Imperial Navy, fought as a captain in the Polish Army against the Bolsheviks, and been reasonably prosperous for some time after he first came to America in 1906, Mr. Delini had been unable to find profitable work during the last several years.

Friends he made as an active worker for the city's foreign-language papers - writer, translator, artist and advertising salesman - contributed to provide the funeral at 3 p.m. today from the Drzewsiecki Funeral Home, 125 S. 15th St., South Side.

Wifem Daughter Killed

Among them were Joseph A. Kortz of the Polish National Alliance, Attorney Blair Gunther of the Polish Central Council, Mrs. Frank Bubacz of the Polish Falcons, the ladies/auxiliary of the Polish War Veterans, and the Ukaranian National Society.

Mr. Delini had occasionally gone back to Poland on business missions and once, after World War I, to fight against the Russians. His wife and daughter were killed in 1939 in the bombing of Warsaw and another daughter, who escaped Warsaw, has been unteported in Italy since that country entered the war.
