Dear Major Chodacki,

In answer to your letter of November 7, we have been in touch with our Washington office and have carefully considered the questions which you put to us.

We can tell you first that the Polish Intelligence reports are considered among the most useful of the many varieties of intelligence received by the Economic Intelligence Division. Obviously, many of the target objectives, in Occupied Europe are no longer target objectives but material on Germany Proper is still very much in demand.

In connection with your question as to the percentage of your material which may be new to FEA, we have great difficulty in giving you an answer because of the large amount of material constantly coming in. In any case, you can be assured that your reports are definitely useful in supplementing reports from other sources. This is especially true when your material goes into great detail.

As to future needs we might say that we have been studying new techniques, new methods, new inventions, new processes and new developments in German technology and industry during the war years, and in this study your material has been most useful. We shall be especially interested to receive from you in the future any reports dealing with more recent German technical and industrial developments with emphasis on the names and locations of the factories and, if possible, the names of the technicians.

We hope that the above will give you some idea of the value of your reports to us during the past year, and we shall hope that we may continue to be the recipient of your reports as long the European war continues.
