Dear Mr. Slawik,

We have just received the following comments from our Washington office on the reports which you bring to us from time to time:

1. It is desired that in the future the same procedure be used as in the past, namely, that these reports should be delivered to this office for transmittal to Washington.

2. It is agreed by all the analysts at Washington that the reports are of great value in their present form as items of current intelligence are of great importance. It is hoped that the flow will continue and increase.

3. The value of the reports would be increased if there were some way /a/ to evaluate the reliability of the informants, and /b/ if it could be stated that the source was primary /that is, direct observation/, or secondary /that is hearsay or rumor/.

4. We will shortly send you specific comments on specific reports among the last lot you brought in to us.

It is assumed that you will understand from the above comments that our Washington office is very pleased with the material you have been kind enough to assemble for us, and that more such material is to be hoped for.
